Schengen border controls (November 2024)

Executive summary

This document provides details of the internal border controls in the Schengen Area as of 11 November 2024, including start and end dates and borders impacted.

Background

- ▶ The Schengen Borders Code ([SBC](#)) enables Member States to temporarily reinstate controls at internal borders of the Schengen Area in exceptional circumstances, such as situations of significant threat to public order or internal security.
- ▶ Reintroduction of such controls must be limited in scope and taken as a measure of last resort in accordance with commonly agreed criteria.
- ▶ For predictable events, internal border controls are limited to 30 days or for the foreseeable duration of the event. In these cases, border controls can be extended for up to 30 days per extension, for a maximum period of six months.
- ▶ Member States must notify the European Commission and other Member States at least four weeks before a planned reintroduction of border controls. In emergency situations, Member States may reintroduce border controls for up to 10 days without prior notification and inform the Commission and other Member States immediately. In these cases, controls may be extended for up to 20 days per extension, for a maximum period of two months.

Impact on employers

The reintroduction of internal border controls leads to additional administrative requirements and delays in travel for individuals crossing internal borders. Employers may stay updated and

Austria	16 October 2024	15 April 2025	Land/sea borders with Slovakia, all borders with Czechia	Irregular migration (e.g., via the Balkan routes), migratory pressure in the pre-frontier area, strain on the asylum reception system, Russia's ongoing aggression against Ukraine, the security situation in the Middle East
Denmark	12 November 2024	11 May 2025	All internal borders, land/sea borders with Germany	Threats to public policy and internal security posed by continuous terrorism-related events and organized crime, acts of physical sabotage by individuals linked to Russia, armed conflicts in the Middle East and Africa, etc.
France	1 November 2024	30 April 2025	Borders with Belgium, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, Spain, Switzerland	Serious threats posed by terrorism, criminal networks facilitating irregular migration and smuggling, risk infiltration by radicalized individuals, irregular crossings on the Channel and North Sea borders, rising violence among migrants
Germany	12 November 2024	15 March 2025	Borders with Austria	Irregular migration, increasing migratory pressure at the EU's external borders because of developments in Afghanistan, Syria and Turkey, Russia's ongoing aggression against Ukraine, security situation in the Middle East, terrorist activity
	16 September 2024	15 March 2025	Borders with Belgium, Denmark, France, Luxembourg, the Netherlands	Irregular migration, including smuggling, at the EU's external borders, increased levels of irregular entries, tense accommodation situation for refugees, especially considering the admission of Ukrainian nationals
	16 June 2024	15 December 2024	Borders with Czechia, Poland, Switzerland	Irregular migration, migrant smuggling activities, strain on the asylum reception system, Russia's ongoing aggression against Ukraine, security situation in the Middle East
Italy	19 June 2024	18 December 2024	Land border with Slovenia	Risk of terrorist activity pertaining to the Middle East situation, risk of terrorist infiltration, risk of violence connected to the continuation of the war in Ukraine and Italy's G7 presidency
Norway	12 November 2024	1 December 2024	All internal borders (land, air, sea)	Threats to public order and internal security, likely threat from state-supported terrorists and proxy actors, severe threat against particularly Jewish and Israeli individuals and institutions
	12 November 2024	11 May 2025	All internal borders, ports with ferry links to the Schengen Area	General threat aimed at the energy sector, threats of sabotage posed by the Russian intelligence service, as well as to increase infrastructure protection
Slovenia	22 June 2024	21 December 2024	Internal borders with Croatia, Hungary	Risks associated with the global security situation (increased instability in the Middle East, Russia's ongoing aggression against Ukraine, organized crime, general terrorist threats), as well as the UEFA EURO 2024 and Olympics
Sweden	12 November 2024	11 May 2025	All internal borders (land, air, sea)	Serious threats to public policy and internal security posed by recent terrorism-related events, serious crime associated with an ongoing armed conflict in the organized crime environment
